2. CONDITIONS OF PARTICIPATION

The International organ competition Dudelange is an open competition without preselection.

2.1 Age limit

Candidates born as of **September 1st 1990**, i.e. less than 35 years old.

2.2 Maximum number of admitted participants

35 candidates

Will be admitted the 35 candidates who first will have introduced their **complete** registration (including registration fee) and who will be **accepted** by the registration office.

A counter installed on www.orgue-dudelange.lu informs continuously about the number of admitted participants.

2.3 Application

Deadline: 15th July 2025

This fee will not be refunded, except if the competition will be cancelled or postponed.

3. GENERAL RULES

- 1. The rehearsal time for the qualifying round will be communicated to the competitors after registration by the registration office. Please direct any special wishes when applying.
- 2. For semi final and final rounds, the order of sequence in which the competitors will rehearse and play, will be determined by casting lots prior to each round.
- 3. The anonymity of the participants towards the jury will be strictly observed in all rounds.
- 4. As long as the candidate is in competition, contacts between the candidate or his assistant and the jury or members of the jury are not allowed.
- 5. Before the first rehearsal each competitor receives help for operating the registration sequencer. During the rehearsal and competition maximum one assistant is admitted for page turning and activation of the sequencer. The assistant may not choose the registrations for the candidate as the registration is part of the candidate's competition.
- 6. The jury will make its decisions in meetings that are not open to the public. Such decisions are final and incontestable.
- 7. The jury is entitled to dispense with awarding prizes, to split a prize or to award special prizes.
- 8. The project leader may cancel the competition if the jury estimates the candidate's applications too low or in case of force majeure. In these cases, the registration fee will be refunded.
- 9. The participants will arrange themselves for their travel, food and accommodation expenses.
- 10. Each competitor will have to send an electronic copy (PDF) of all scores of 2nd and final round before 15th July. Personal notes, except fingerings, are not allowed.
- 11. All rounds are open to public.
- 12. It is forbidden to make any kind of recordings during all rounds.
- 13. Only the media partner of the competition, radio Opus 100,7 is allowed to record the final round.
- 14. Each participant automatically accepts these conditions when applying.
- 15. All items may be subject to modification.

Location and origins of the competition

St. Martin's Church, Dudelange / rue de l'Église L-3463 Dudelange (Grand Duchy of Luxembourg). This organ competition took its start in 2007 as a project of "Luxembourg and Greater Region – European Capital of Culture 2007". The competition in 2025 will be its 10th edition.

5. JURY

Stephen THARP (New York), President

Stephen Tharp is a Grammy-nominated concert organist based in New York City. Having undertaken more than 70 tours worldwide, Stephen Tharp has built a well-respected international career in famous cathedrals and concert venues of the world. Stephen Tharp remains an important champion of new organ music, and continues to commission and premiere numerous compositions for the instrument. Composers who have subsequently dedicated works to him include George Baker, David Briggs, Samuel Adler, Thierry Escaich, Philip Moore and Anthony Newman.

As an active NYC chamber musician he has performed with artists such as Thomas Hampson, Itzhak Perlman, Jennifer Larmore, the St. Thomas Choir (John Scott, conductor), and at Carnegie Hall, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and Avery Fisher Hall at Lincoln Center. Among his 16 solo organ recordings, his commercial release *The Complete Organ Works of Jeanne Demessieux* recorded at the organs of St. Martin's in Dudelange and Saint-Ouen in Rouen on Aeolus Recordings, received the *2009 Preis der Deutschen Schallplattenkritik*, as well as the French *5 Diapason* award. The release was celebrated in October 2010 with Mr. Tharp's performance of the complete Demessieux works live over three concerts at New York's Cathedral of St. John the Divine. www.stephentharp.com

Loreto ARAMENDI (San Sebastian)

Loreto Aramendi is an international concertist and main organist of the Cavaillé-Coll organ (1863) of the Basilica Santa Maria del Coro in San Sebastian. She has published three double CD recorded on the organs of the Basilique of Santa Maria del Coro, Saint-Ouen in Rouen and the cathedral of Salamanca and Saintanyi (Mallorca). As concertist, prestigious venues have been Opera City Hall Tokyo, Auditorio Nacional Madrid, Notre-Dame de Paris, St. Patrick's Cathedral New York, Stavanger Auditorium, Maison de la Radio in Paris, Westminster Cathedral a.o. She has been jury member in international organ competitions as well as teacher in master classes. She is actually teaching organ at the Conservatoy F. Escudero in San Sebastian.

Winfried BÖNIG (Cologne)

Since 2001, Winfried Bönig is main organist of Cologne cathedral and since 1998, professor for organ and improvisation at High School for Music in Cologne. After his studies since 1978 in the class of Franz Lehrndorfer at Music High Scxhool in Munich, he started his career as organist at St. Joseph's church in Memmingen, where he has been from 1984 to 1998 main organist of the first great organ buld by Jann. He has premiered many works dedicated to him by composers like Enjott Schneider, Jean Guillou, Naji Hakim, Stephen Tharp, Daniel Roth. As organist and conductor, he has recorded a large numbers of CDs. Among them the recordings at the organs of Cologne Cathedral have been highly acclaimed.

Paul BREISCH (Luxembourg)

Seven Premiers Prix at Conservatoire Supérieur de Musique de Paris (classes of Michel Bouvard, Olivier Latry, Thierry Escaich and Loïc Mallié) and in 1999 laureate of Concours International d'Orgue "André Marchal" de la Ville de Biarritz. Since 2003 he is Professor for organ at the Conservatoire de Musique de la Ville d'Esch-sur-Alzette and in 2006 successor of Carlo Hommel as titular organist of both organs (classical Westenfelder and symphonic Haupt-Rieger) of Cathédrale Notre-Dame de Luxembourg.

Attachment 2: List of a selection of works by George Baker for the final round

George Baker

A native of Dallas, George Baker has received training with some of the finest organ teachers of the twentieth century. He obtained his bachelor's degree (organ) from SMU under Robert Anderson, after which he traveled to Paris to study with Marie-Claire Alain, Pierre Cochereau, Jean Langlais, André Marchal, and Nadia Boulanger. Baker earned the Prix de Virtuosité with Maximum Mention (organ and improvisation) from the Schola Cantorum in Paris, under Langlais (1975). Ultimately, he returned to the United States, where he earned his M.M. and D.M.A. degrees, before deciding to undertake the challenge of becoming a medical doctor. Although he obtained his M.D. and became a dermatologist, Dr. Baker never ceased performing, composing, teaching, and recording.

In his early years as a musician, George Baker won first prizes by unanimous jury decisions in several major organ competitions including the AGO (Buffalo, 1970), the Grand Prix de Chartres (Chartres, France, 1974) and the International Improvisation Competition (Lyon, France, 1979). His recording credits include the complete organ works of J. S. Bach (1979, the first to be recorded by an American artist) and the complete organ works of Louis Vierne (world premiere recording, released in 1994, a project he shared with Pierre Cochereau). Other recordings include works of Langlais, Milhaud, Reger, Hindemith, Clérambault, DuMage, Ives, Sowerby, Dupré, and Baker. George Baker has been awarded three French Grand Prix du Disque.

George Baker's compositions have been frequently performed and recorded in the United States, Europe, and Asia. His current self-published catalog (baroquenotesmusic.com) includes twenty-three musical titles, along with his treatise, Workbook for Organ Improvisation.

George Baker is currently Adjunct Associate Professor of Organ at Southern Methodist University in Dallas TX, where he teaches organ and organ improvisation.

Each finalist will have to perform one of these works.
